The purpose of the Child Health and Disability Prevention (CHDP) Program Health Assessment Guidelines (Guidelines) is to set a standard for pediatric health assessments for children served by CHDP. The Guidelines include the frequency and content of the examination, the definition of the test to be provided, and recommendations for anticipatory guidance. CHDP expects that eligible children between ages 0-21 years will receive all assessments and appropriate testing, except when deemed by the health care provider to be contraindicated; recently done and therefore not needed; or refused by the patient and/or parent. The Guidelines are not designed to constrain the examiner from doing a more extensive examination nor from using similar but equivalent tests, as long as they are performed and billed within the regulations and policies of the Program. The Guidelines describe the required screening procedures and tests and include recommended criteria for appropriate referrals to diagnosis and treatment. Any child with a suspected condition identified during a health assessment, and who is not currently receiving care for that condition, must be offered diagnostic and treatment services. Examiners are to give care within their area or areas of expertise. If care is needed outside of their expertise, the examiner must refer the child and the family to appropriate and accessible providers. When an examiner suspects a child of having a California Children's Services eligible condition, the examiner must inform the family of the availability of the California Children's Services program services and refer the child and their family. CHDP is implementing Bright Futures' guidelines and tools, including the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) updates and revisions that become AAP official policy. AAP's goal is to periodically update and promote implementation of <u>Bright Futures:</u> <u>Guidelines for Health Supervision of Infants, Children, and Adolescents*</u> among health care professionals, public/private partners with key child health constituencies, communities, and families. AAP also recognizes that the Affordable Care Act requires the provision of essential preventive care services as recommended by Bright Futures. In addition, Medi-Cal managed care health plans are required to provide preventive services for all members less than 21 years of age as specified by the most recent AAP guidelines and <u>periodicity schedules</u>. Bright Futures and AAP will continue to update and release future editions with the most recent AAP approved scientific based standards for pediatric child health care. California's CHDP program will also continue to provide updated information based on AAP's Bright Futures recommendations.
